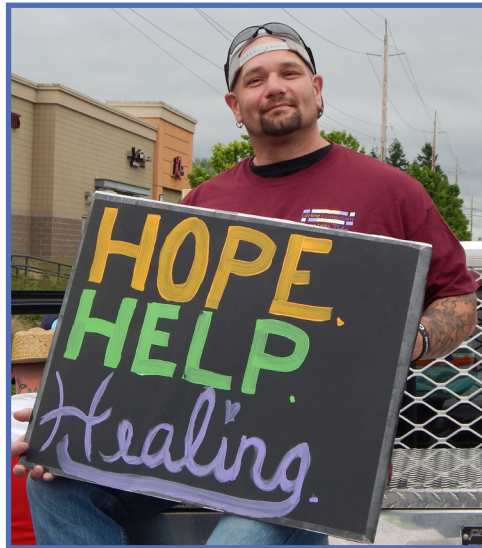

Client Story | William Balabon

William Balabon, 46, was born and raised in Clark County. As the third-youngest of eight children, William had a rough childhood. When he was very young he was beaten and taken advantage of by a family member. He never felt like he fit in, resulting in behavior that got him kicked out of the house and onto the streets where he started a life of crime and drug addiction. Spending much of his time institutionalized, he did not know what life was like on the outside. He also had the perception that his family didn't care about him. "I was like a triple tornado running from people and ruining lives."

His involvement with the criminal justice system spanned nearly three decades of his life. Seven of his twenty-three felony convictions occurred in a single week, following the death of his brother. After five prison terms that kept him incarcerated for over fifteen years, more than 20 years of methamphetamine use, and recovery attempts at seven treatment centers, William was finally done. He felt suicidal, and he knew he needed help. A friend called at the right time. William got himself into Lifeline Connections. While in treatment, William was able to put his ego aside and began to identify mental health conditions that



needed to be addressed. Learning to manage his mental health became a big part of his treatment and remains a big part of his recovery today. "Once you deflate the ego, start listening and taking direction, and find God—things get better."

On July 2nd, William celebrated two years clean and sober. Today he has his own place, a full time job, his 16-year-old son living with him and a third child due in September. William is pleased that this child will be born into a clean and sober environment. He has rebuilt relationships with his family and just returned from his second consecutive family reunion. Williams's mom calls three to four times a week and tells him she loves him and how proud she is. "I mean super-duper-looper proud of me!" William says with a smile.

William also found a life of service when he found Lifeline Connections, and he continues to give back to the community. He finds strength in R360overy serving as a case manager in a supportive living house through Grace Ministries/Xchange, and he speaks on bi-weekly panels to Lifeline residential and detox patients. When asked what his short term goals are his response is simply, "Being a better man today than I was yesterday."

Program Highlight - Facilities | Chris Attaway

Lifeline's Facilities Department is a busy place for Chris Attaway and Phillip Jurries. This department is a hub of activity for all of Lifeline's facility functions, impacting all departments throughout the agency. The department oversees purchasing, building maintenance for three locations, mail distribution, key distribution, laundry services, and vehicle upkeep and maintenance. Chris Attaway is the Facilities Supervisor/Purchasing Agent, and he also supervises the UA and Recovery Coach programs. The professionalism, dedication, and work ethic of both Chris and Phillip ensure that very few tasks are missed.

In addition to his busy work schedule, Chris participated as a member of the 2016 Leadership Clark County class which held graduation ceremonies at Washington State University-Vancouver on Thursday, June 9th. Leadership Clark County is a civic leadership development program that brings together individuals with diverse interests and expertise and challenges them to increase their knowledge of Clark County and deepen their community engagement. Chris' increased leadership skills are sure to benefit all of the programs he supervises.

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American Psychiatric Association Foundation Award

Lifeline Connections was honored to receive the American Psychiatric Association Foundation Award for Advancing Minority Mental Health in support of Lifeline Connections Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program. Lifeline Connections' Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program is one of only a small handful in the nation—less than half a dozen—that provides treatment for drug and alcohol addiction in American Sign Language (ASL). Since the program began in 2001 a deep trust has grown between the region's deaf community and the team at Lifeline Connections. Staff members have tenaciously hung onto their commitment to serve this population in spite of funding shifts that dramatically reshaped services the past several years.

The Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program's goal is to help patients live clean and sober lives and effectively integrate into their communities in ways that assure their continued sobriety and health.

Funds from the award will be used to provide patient incentives, to purchase educational materials and provide specialized training for staff members. Lifeline Connections recently signed a service agreement with the state of Oregon that allows the program to serve Oregonians.
