Lifeline Connections has been providing services for our community for over 50 years helping people within our community who are struggling with mental health, drug, and alcohol abuse. We provide adult residential, court, youth, outpatient, detoxification and sobering programs for many of our neighbors and family in the Pacific Northwest.

We prepare this report annually to demonstrate our staff's passion and efforts to help patients in Washington State. The Board of Directors are grateful by the efforts of Lifeline's CEO Jared Sanford, executives, managers and staff, to help this and other regions and grow our programs.

Lifeline Connections has continued to maintain the financial stability needed to provide services to residents in Washington State. We have opened new facilities in Aberdeen and South Bend, WA. We have reached our goal for funding a pregnancy and parenting women's inpatient program, which will allow mothers to receive treatment while caring for their young children. With further funding and fundraising we plan to open the program in the next fiscal year. We have implemented an electronic health record this year, helping coordinate medical care with our patients.

We will continue to develop better programs and funding to help people improve on their potential outcomes while fighting mental health conditions and substance use disorders.

Withdrawal Management Programs

Clark County

Sobering Services Program

The Sobering Unit can serve as the "front door" to sobriety in getting help with addiction. This unit offers persons over the age of 18 a safe environment in which to overcome the immediate effects of alcohol and/or other drug intoxication. This program serves as a diversion from jail and the local emergency departments.

The service operates free of charge to Washington State residents and is a 26 bed inpatient program, which is open 24 hours a day seven days a week with a maximum 12 hours length of stay. Admission is based on a brief assessment upon arrival. No referral is required. The goal is to maximize the "window of opportunity" in which an individual might be most amenable to make life changes.

In 2017, the program added a vehicle. The Sobering Urgent Response Vehicle (SURV) works with local law enforcement, emergency medical and local hospitals to coordinate the pickup of individuals and transport them back to the Sobering Unit.

Detoxification Program

Lifeline provides a medication-assisted detoxification program to help patients attain mental and physical stability without harmful side effects. Detoxification is a 1-5 day inpatient stay, where patients are assisted by our medical team of doctors and nurses as well as caring support staff. We provide compassion and are dedicated to helping our patients reach their goal of sobriety.



Substance Use Disorder Residential Program

Clark County

After an individual has safely detoxed from drugs and/or alcohol they are encouraged to continue treatment into our residential program. The goal of this program is to provide individual, group and family counseling and support to help individuals learn skills to live a substance-free life. This program lasts 21-30 days on average and is located just down the hall from our detoxification unit. Patients enjoy an environment that includes community access and structure to help them build life skills.

To assist patients in achieving overall wellness, the unit offers a fitness room featuring an elliptical, recumbent bikes, and a stand up bike along with free weights, stretching bands and balance/stability ball. Rounding out the wellness, offerings professional community volunteers provide weekly yoga session and pet therapy helping patients achieve overall wellness and balance



Substance Use Disorder Outpatient Programs

Clark, Grays Harbor and Pacific Counties

Substance Use Disorder Outpatient

Outpatient treatment includes individual and group therapy sessions; the intensity of sessions depends on the individual's needs from weekly to monthly meetings. During sessions patients are educated on relapse prevention and coping skills amongst many other tools to help adjust and continue a substance free lifestyle. The goal of this program is to help patients achieve and maintain sobriety, and reintegrate into their communities.

Intensive Substance Use Disorder Outpatient

There are times and situations where Lifeline Connections' substance use disorder intensive outpatient program is the best way to achieve and maintain sobriety. This program provides intensive individual and group therapy. We provide confidential and comprehensive intensive outpatient treatment options in four or more group sessions per week

to help individuals achieve sobriety and stay clean and sober, while still living in the community.

Medication Assisted Treatment

Patients who are enrolled in our outpatient programs also have the option of being prescribed medication to help with their opioid addiction or alcoholism. In Lifeline's Medication Assisted Treatment program a variety of medications are used, including Suboxone® and Vivitrol®. These medications help individuals gain stability in their life so they can engage in individual and group therapy where new life skills are taught and learned.

Deaf & Hard of Hearing Program

Lifeline's Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program is one of only a handful in the nation. Treatment for drug and alcohol addiction is provided using American Sign Language. Outpatient services include group sessions for anger management, coping skills, and relapse prevention. Treatment is experienced with other individuals in the deaf community.

Recovery Coach

Through the process of Recovery Coaching, patients deepen their learning, improve their performance, and enhance their quality of life. In each meeting, the patient chooses the focus of conversation, while the coach listens and contributes observations and questions. This interaction creates clarity and moves the patient toward action. Recovery Coaching accelerates the patient's progress in recovery by providing greater focus and awareness of choices, actions, and responsibility. Coaching concentrates on where patients are now and what they are willing to do to enjoy a better tomorrow.

Mental Health Programs

Clark, Grays Harbor and Pacific Counties

Mental Health & Co-Occuring Outpatient

Individual counseling, group therapy, case management, peer support, and medication management provide hope for individuals struggling with a mental illness and who could also be struggling with a substance use disorder. Individuals struggling with a mental health condition can and do gain stability through the use of effective therapy.

COMET

COMET is an assertive community treatment program that operates in Clark County and provides intensive, community-based services to individuals with severe mental illness and substance use disorders. We offer individual, group, peer support, medication management, nursing, housing, employment, and case management services on a 24 hour basis to help adults gain and maintain their stability.

ECS & ORCS

Expanded Community Support (ECS)

Our ECS team provides behavioral support to adults residing in adult family home placements across Clark County. We offer training and collaboration with the providers and work to help manage challenging behaviors which can jeopardize the successful placement of a patient in a new home. Last year we provided services to 57 adults with an average age of 59 years old.

Offender Re-Entry Community Support (ORCS)

The ORCS program provides ongoing support for individuals who are transitioning from prison whose crime was violent and exacerbated by their mental illness. The program offers assistance with housing and basic needs for up to 5 years so long as the patient remains active in mental health services. Engagement begins prior to release in order to make a strong transition plan and to build rapport. After releasing, patients begin services within the COMET program and then transfer to lower levels of care as they remain stabilized in the community.

Therapeutic Specialty Courts

Clark County

Jail Transition Services

Jail transition services provide individuals that are currently incarcerated in the Clark County jail with services that helps them transition to mental health programs upon release. Staff engage referred individuals while incarcerated and generally pick them up on release day to assist in the required activities to set them up for success.

Through a community partnership with the Clark County Superior and District court systems individuals who have been accepted into the adult drug court, substance abuse court, family treatment court, or the juvenile drug court program are offered an opportunity to participate in an intensive program for a minimum of one year.

Part of this program is receiving treatment at Lifeline Connections instead of going to jail and/or prison. Lifeline Connections' clinicians provide substance use disorder treatment. Case management services are also provided to assist the patients in successfully graduating from the court program and gaining access to community resources.

Jail Re-Entry Program

The Jail Re-Entry Program enables those individuals currently incarcerated in the Clark County jail to have access to a substance use disorder assessment and linkage to community resources once they are discharged. The jail re-entry staff member goes into the jail to provide an assessment and provides referrals for treatment resources.



Lifeline Connections Opens a Behavioral Health Outpatient Program in Aberdeen and South Bend Washington

The transition from elementary school to middle school can be tough for any kid but proved to be especially difficult for Patrick. Patrick grew up in a very rural community, the type of community where you know everyone. The average class size in the very small elementary school was 18 students with a maximum student body of only 110 in the whole school. Transferring to the middle school in Tumwater meant a change of schools and a complete change of environment. Patrick's love of music found him gravitating to the music scene where he found kids that were drinking.

In 2016, Patrick had given up on trying to get into treatment but happened to be seeing a nurse at SeaMar in Tumwater for a medical issue when she referred him to the addiction medicine department. A bed happened to be available the next day at Lifeline. He jumped on a train and found himself in residential treatment the next day with \$22 to his name and a

bag of tobacco. He was scared and feared the unknown.

Patrick instantly found Alex, Residential Floor Staff, too was a diehard SeaHawks fan so there was someone to connect with. Christi, counselor, made a big impact and then there was another counselor that spent 45 minutes with him when he was struggling with severe depression, although he didn't have an appointment with her. He knew that staff really cared and wanted to see him succeed.

When asked what was different about the inpatient treatment at Lifeline Connections he said he was just done. When entering treatment in the past it was to stay out of jail or he was fighting for his son. This time he was fighting for himself. The move from Tumwater to Vancouver allowed him to feel safe in Vancouver's strong recovery community.

Patrick found support and that made all the difference in where his life is today. He credits Kleen Street for providing housing, recovery coaches for requiring accountability, ATR funds for giving him a start, HEN (Housing and Essential Needs) for rent assistance, Blue Door AA Meetings, and his strong work ethic, skills as a roofer, and goal driven personality to much of his success.




