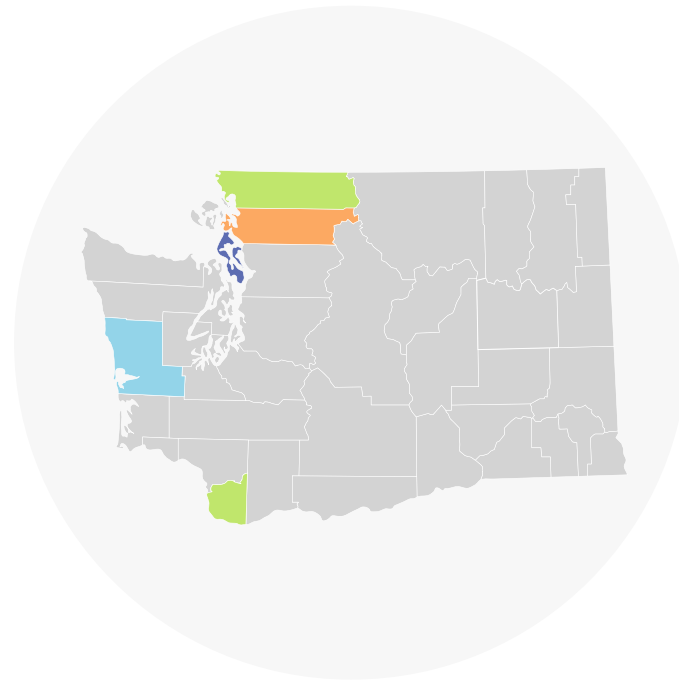

Wow! What a year to be in any kind of business! The COVID-19 pandemic has required all of us to adjust, redefine a new normal and remain nimble as we continue to navigate this major disruption in our daily lives.

First, I want to thank the Lifeline Connections staff who showed tenacity, flexibility, and heart to serve some of the most vulnerable members of our communities. Healthcare in general and behavioral healthcare is a tough profession during a pandemic. Quality behavioral health services are needed, and more in demand, than in recent history. I am pleased to report that Lifeline Connections is well positioned to meet the changing needs of our clients.

After several years of planning, through many setbacks and hiccups, and an ever-changing COVID-19 restrictions environment, we opened the Crisis Wellness Center, August of 2020. This facility is a tremendous resource to the entire region. Thank you to all for your commitment and sometimes herculean efforts to overcome barriers while keeping your eye on the goal of opening this beautiful new facility.

In February, Lifeline Connections received a nearly \$4,000,000 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Improvement and Advancement Grant. The funding is the first of a two-grant series designed to transform the agency into a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC). In doing so, we will have the privilege of providing comprehensive, integrated, coordinated and person-centered behavioral healthcare to all regardless of their ability to pay.

One of our first steps in implementing the many requirements of the SAMHSA grant was to expand and remodel our Orchards (East Vancouver) office to accommodate five exam rooms so that integrated care could be offered to our patients.

These many accomplishments are only possible with strong executive leadership, a committed Board of Directors, and staff who believe that if we provide good, quality, affordable, evidence base services lives can transform and become better and by so doing we truly are making a positive impact in the communities we serve. I am grateful and proud to be associated with such an organization.

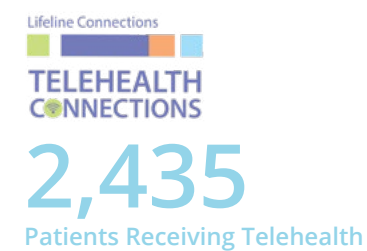
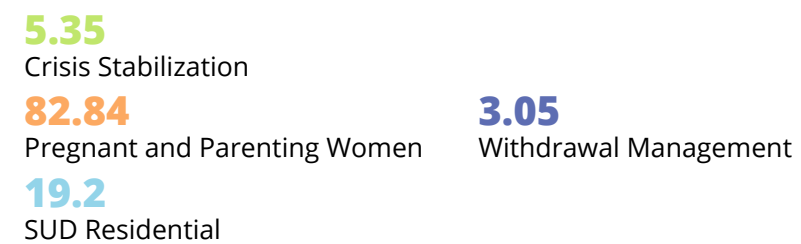


PRIMARY DRUGS USED

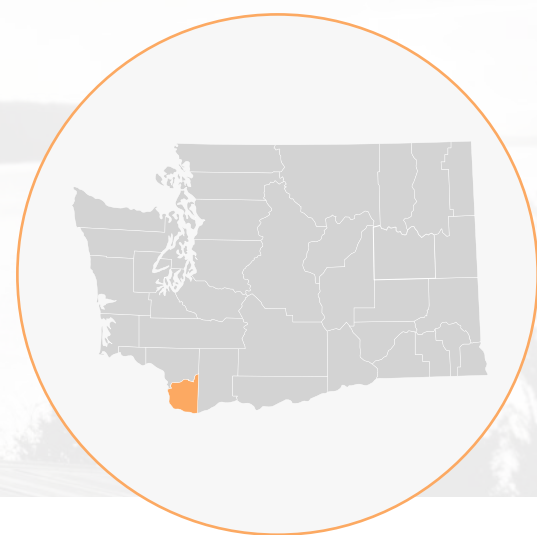

crisis and stabilization inpatient programs



■ Crisis Triage and Stabilization Program

Lifeline provides short-term crisis residential services for adults experiencing an acute mental health crisis. The Crisis Triage and Stabilization program is an alternative to hospitalization or can decrease the length of hospitalization.

These services are time-specific, patient focused, and strength based.

■ Detoxification Program

Lifeline provides a medication-assisted detoxification program to help patients attain mental and physical stability without harmful side effects. Detoxification is a 1-5-day inpatient stay. We provide compassion and are dedicated to helping our patients reach their goal of sobriety.

■ Sobering Services Program

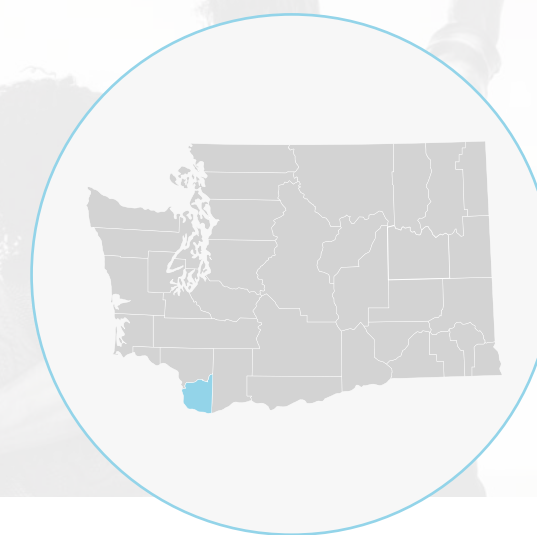
The Sobering Unit can serve as the “front door” to sobriety in getting help with addiction. This unit offers those over the age of 18 a safe environment in which to overcome the immediate effects of alcohol and/or other drug intoxication. substance use disorder residential programs



■ Men’s and Women’s Residential Program

The goal of this program is to provide individual, group and family counseling while providing skills to help individuals learn to live a substance-free life. This program lasts 30-45 days on average.

■ Pregnant and Parenting Women’s Program

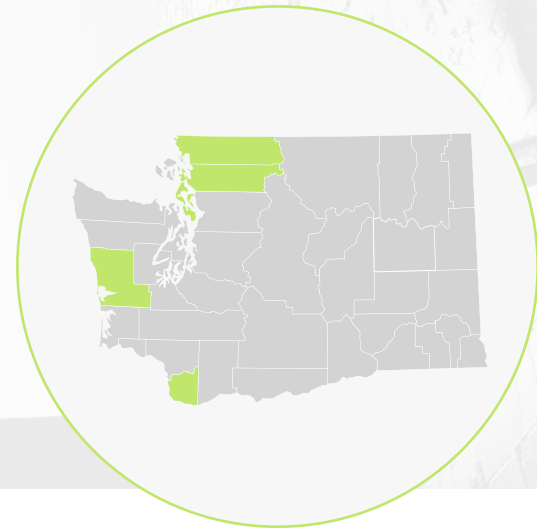
This is a long-term residential, 3 to 6 months, 17 bed program which allows mothers to keep their children, birth to five, with them during their substance use treatment. Women are welcome in all different stages of parenting and supported as they deliver their baby, increase parenting knowledge, obtain visitation and/or custody, and embrace motherhood.

substance use disorder outpatient programs



■ Outpatient Treatment

Outpatient treatment includes individual and group therapy sessions; the intensity of sessions depends on the individual's needs from weekly to monthly meetings. During sessions patients are educated on relapse prevention and coping skills amongst many other tools to help adjust and continue a substance free lifestyle. The goal of this program is to help patients achieve and maintain sobriety, and reintegrate into their communities.

■ Medication Assisted Recovery

Patients enrolled in the Medication Assisted Recovery Program have the option of being prescribed medication to help with their opioid addiction or alcoholism. Medications used include Suboxone® and Vivitrol®. These medications help individuals gain stability in their life so they can engage in therapy where new life skills are taught and learned.

■ Deaf and Hard of Hearing Outpatient Program

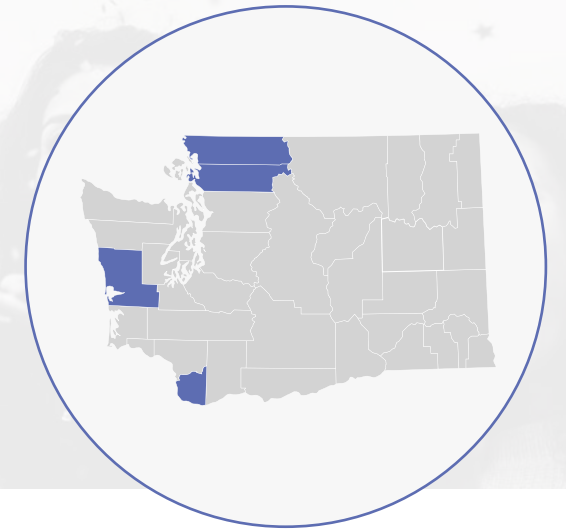
Lifeline's Deaf and Hard of Hearing Outpatient Program is one of only a handful in the nation. Treatment for drug and alcohol addiction is provided using American Sign Language. Outpatient services include group sessions for anger management, coping skills, and relapse prevention. Treatment is experienced with other individuals in the deaf community.

■ Offender Re-Entry Community Support (ORCS)

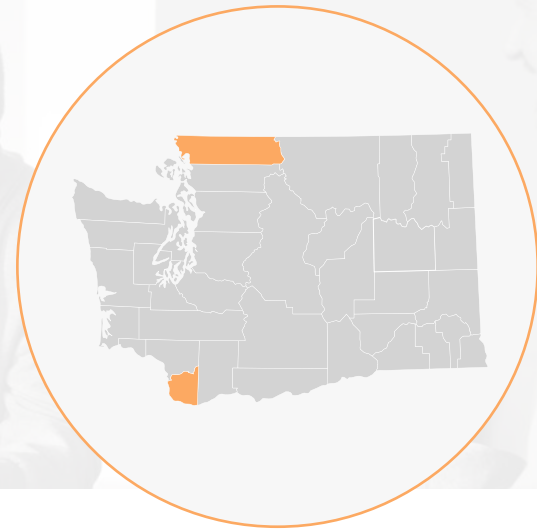
The ORCS program provides ongoing support for individuals who are transitioning from prison whose crime was violent and exacerbated by their mental health condition. The program helps with housing and basic needs for up to 5 years so long as the patient remains active in mental health services. Engagement begins prior to release to all for a strong transition plan and to build rapport.

Therapeutic Specialty Courts

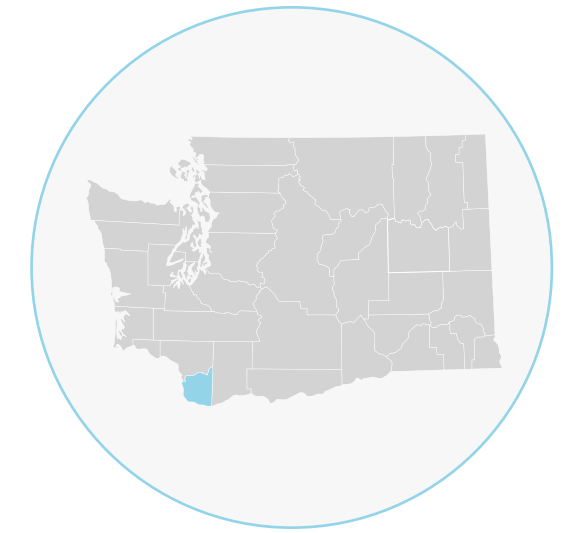
Through a community partnership with the Superior and District court systems, individuals who have been accepted into the adult drug court, substance abuse court, family treatment court, or the juvenile drug court program are offered an opportunity to participate in an intensive program for a minimum of one year. Part of this program is receiving treatment at Lifeline Connections instead of going to jail and/or prison. Lifeline Connections' clinicians provide substance use disorder treatment. Case management services are also provided to assist individuals in successfully graduating from the court program and gaining access to community resources.

community based programs



CAMP MARIPOSA

This year-round program serves youth ages 9-12 who have been affected by the substance use of a loved one. Lifeline Connections has partnered with the Eluna Network, a nationwide organization, to host the thirteenth Camp Mariposa, Serving a capacity of 36 youth throughout the year, Camp Mariposa of SW Washington provides opportunities for youth to connect with peers who have experienced similar adversities and mentors who are enthusiastic to offer their support and kindness throughout camping weekends.

COMET/PACT

This assertive community treatment program provides intensive, community-based services to individuals with severe mental illness and substance use disorders by offering individual and group sessions including successful placement of a patient into a new home.

Expanded Community Support (ECS)

The ECS team provides behavioral support to adults residing in adult family homes. We offer training and collaboration with the providers and work to help manage challenging behaviors which can jeopardize the successful placement of a patient in a new home.

Jail Services

The Jail transition service provides individuals that are currently incarcerated with services that help them transition to mental health programs upon release. Staff engage referred individuals while incarcerated and generally pick them up on release day to assist in the required activities to set them up for success.

The Jail Re-Entry Program enables individuals currently incarcerated to have access to a substance use disorder assessment and linkage to community resources once they are discharged. The jail re-entry staff member goes into the jail to provide an assessment and provides referrals for treatment resources.

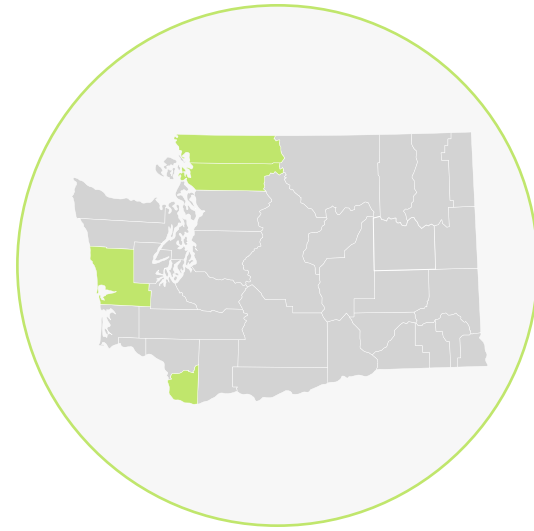

School-Based Programs

Behavioral health school-based programs provide individual therapy to students that the prevention specialist at the school has identified as being in need of behavioral health services. Often students deal with high levels of stress and family conflicts. The student can connect with the therapist throughout their school day/week making for easier access of behavioral health services.

Supportive Employment Services

Supportive Employment is an approach to vocational rehabilitation that emphasizes assisting people in their efforts to achieve steady, meaningful employment in mainstream competitive jobs.

Our Supportive Housing program is assisting people with behavioral health conditions who are also experiencing homelessness or are transitioning out of institutional settings, as well as people with a behavioral health condition.

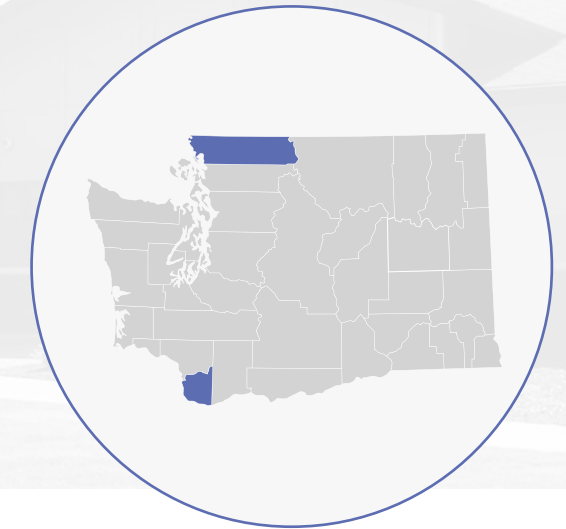

Home Services

Health Homes is not a place, but a set of services to provide care coordination for high cost/high risk Medicaid patients in Washington. Eligible patients have chronic health conditions including physical health conditions (e.g. diabetes, cancer, HIV) and/or behavioral health conditions (e.g. a mental health condition or substance use disorder).
